# MICHIGAN LAW

## For Youth

### It is illegal for a person under the age of 21 to:

- Consume alcohol.
- Have any bodily alcohol content.
- Have alcohol in their possession regardless if they consumed or not.
- Use a fake ID to obtain alcohol.
- Transport an unopened alcohol container in a motor vehicle.
- Possess or transfer an opened alcohol container in a motor vehicle.
- Allow any person to use your motor vehicle after they have been drinking.

### If you are under 21 and are caught with alcohol in your possession ("Minor In Possession" or MIP)

#### The First Time

- Fine \$100.
- If you are under 18, your parents will be notified.
- May receive court imposed requirements for education, screening, assessment, treatment, and/or community service.
- Entered into a statewide tracking system.
- Opportunity to not have a misdemeanor record if you complete all probation requirements.

## For Parents and Other Adults

### Did you Know?

- It is illegal to provide alcohol to minors. You can be charged with a felony.
- It is illegal to provide alcohol to minors in your own home.
- It is illegal to provide a fake ID to anyone under 21
- You are legally responsible for anything that might happen to a minor who has been served alcohol in your home.
- You may be subject to criminal prosecution and fines.
- If you furnish alcohol to a minor you may be liable for monetary damages caused by that individual in a civil lawsuit.

### Providing Alcohol to Minors is ILLEGAL

**Fines are up to \$1000 and/or up to 60 days in jail and possible community service.**
